THESIS TITLE: SEMANTIC CHALLENGES OF CROSS-CULTURAL

TRANSLATION: An Appraisal of the Notion of Conflict in the Luganda and German

Translations of 'Animal Farm'

Abstract

This study focuses on the semantic challenges of cross-cultural translation in German and

Luganda translations of George Orwell's Animal Farm. This is achieved by appraising

negative associations of conflict in the source text such as displeasure, discomfort, hurt

feelings, loss of face, hostility, and violence but also sources of positive emotions that

encourage avoidance of conflict. The researcher sought to establish whether the two

translations - Farm der Tiere and Amaka ga Bawansolo maintained the stance and context of

the original.

The study is purely qualitative and employs The Appraisal Framework, specifically its sub-

types Attitude and Graduation as methods. By employing Attitude and Graduation, the study

is able to achieve the three objectives of the study which are: To identify and categorize the

types and subtypes of the notion of conflict in Animal Farm; to assess the representation of

the author's stance and context through the notion of conflict in the target texts; to investigate

the semantic challenges faced by the two translators.

Findings indicate that translation challenges led to variations from the source text structure

and these variations made by the German and Luganda translators are different in nature. It

was also found that the translations sometimes affected the meaning of the source text

message.

The researcher recommends that current translators and translation scholars should embrace

other linguistic theories, models, and frameworks like the Appraisal Framework to enable

them to borrow from the knowledge of applied linguistics in their work.
